Celebration is a contemporary still life painting base on the philosophy of seventeenth century artists who painted motifs symbolic of the transitory nature of life; the genre was known as Vanitas meaning Vanity. Celebration portrays a group of colored glass bottles evoking a dual symbolism, i.e., the bottles as humankind and the positions implying recklessness. Applying oil paint with a palette knife, the artist attempted to portray the movement of humanity from active living to a deathly stillness, by deliberately placing the bottles against a painted background of intense raw tube colors fading to pale tinted mixtures; interspersed with white glimmers of tears. In addition, the artist uses the symbol of red wine draining from the bottle to again suggest, not so subtly, the life blood draining from the being.
